ULRICH WERNER, from the Stuttgart-based Southwest German Co-operative Federation, joined us briefly in January to research the importance of co-operatives in Canadian society and in community economies.

ARMANDO LESSA, from Brazil, was with us for several months working with Michael Gertler on a research project investigating farmers' market co-operatives.

GEORGE HENDRY, a farmer from Scotland and Farmer of the Year Award winner from the Crown Estates of the British Isles, spent time with us studying agricultural co-operatives. The award allowed him to go anywhere in the world to study and he chose our Centre and the Wisconsin Center for Cooperatives.

2000–2001

MARCELO BARROSO, a student of agronomic engineering from the Escola Superior de Agricultura, Universidade de São Paulo, Brazil, was with us from January to May 2001, fulfilling the professional training component of his undergraduate degree.

1994–1995

PAUL MCLAUGHLIN, from the University of New Jersey, Sociology Department, joined the Centre for three months to conduct research on the consumer co-operative movement.

1991–1992

PATRICK DEVELTERE, project director of the International Development Service for the Belgium Christian Workers' Studies at Leuven University in Belgium, began his three-month stay with us in mid-February 1991. He was pursuing doctoral studies at Leuven University, with thesis work on the role of co-operatives in the development of third-world countries. His project at the Centre focused on the evolution of co-operatives from government-mandated organizations to spontaneous grassroots social movements.

EDITH GUIGET, from the National University, Argentina, visited the Centre during the first two weeks of July 1991 as part of her research tour of Canadian co-operatives for a project comparing the co-operative systems in Canada and Argentina.

IAN MCKENNA, from the University of Lethbridge, Alberta, came to the Centre for several days in December 1991 to discuss co-operative theory and co-operative enterprise with Centre faculty. He also gathered ideas for course development in the area of co-operatives and industrial relations.

GEORGE MELNYK, from the University of Calgary, spent three months at the Centre beginning in early January 1992 working on the revision of his widely used book *The Search for Community: From Utopia to a Co-operative Society* (Black Rose Books, 1985; Japanese edition, 1990).

YONGMEI TANG, from Guizhou Agricultural College in China, a visiting scholar at the University of Alberta in the Faculty of Agriculture and Forestry, visited the Centre in February 1992 to meet the staff and use the library resources. She was researching the role of co-operatives in agricultural development.

HITONI NAKAMICHI, from the Central Co-operative College, Tokyo, Japan, visited the centre as part of a tour of co-operatives and educational institutions in Canada to gather information for a major revision of her college's curriculum on agriculture and co-operatives.

1990–1991
